As this newsletter was going to print, East West Rail announced their route decision for their Bedford to Cambridge section. Many in the village were concerned that they would choose the Northern route which would have passed through or near Dry Drayton. But instead they have opted for the Southern Route.

They say: "Our conclusion remains that approaching Cambridge from the south is the best solution for the city, the region and – given the global opportunity at the Biomedical Campus – for the whole of the UK too."

We're sharing the sad news that long-time village resident Howard Russell (pictured above with his wife Gill) died in early May.

Howard and Gill had lived in Cotton's Field since 1973 until they moved – just over a year ago – to Buckinghamshire to be closer to their family. Throughout their time in the village, Howard was involved in many activities here and was among

the founders of the Dry Drayton School and Village Association. He also had a fine singing voice and loved performing in village pantomimes and revues.

His voluntary roles included chairing the Dry Drayton Parish Council and the village charity Town Lands (which was set up before 1616 when land was given "for the poor of Dry Drayton".) Most recently, Town Lands bought, and now manages, the Edwards Woodland for the use and enjoyment of the village.

Village Facebook page moves after admin's conviction

The village Facebook group – a community resource used by many in Dry Drayton – is being moved to a new page after its creator, Chris Downes, was jailed for sex offences including making indecent images of children.

He had set up the 'Dry Drayton People' group as a community page for the village in February 2019. He also used it to advertise his own property maintenance business, Cambridge Property Care, which carried out carpentry and repairs in local homes.

The village Facebook group has been a valuable information resource for many. It communicates news about village events and local services as well as

potholes, power cuts, burst water mains, escaped animals, road closures and traffic accidents. However, following Chris's sentencing, the remaining administrators of the Facebook group decided it was not appropriate for him to be associated with the group and decided to replace it with a new one.

The Churchyard IN LATE SPRING

Since March bluebells, primroses, daisies, Star-of Bethlehem and crosswort (a relative of lady's bedstraw) have flowered in the churchyard. The laburnum on the corner of the Madingley Road junction is covered with cascades of golden blossoms, attracting both insects and birds in search of a tasty aphid or two!

The emergence of the insects in the warmer weather coincides with increased bat activity. A recent "bat sounding" using specialist equipment to record the sonographs of the calls identified three species at dusk: common pipistrelle, soprano pipistrelle and noctule.



A Date For Your Diary - DRY DRAYTON PARISH BOUNDARY WALK 2023

Based on the ancient custom of Beating the Bounds, writes Alec Hawkes, we plan to walk the Parish Boundaries on Saturday 24th June. In England the tradition is centuries old, dating from at least Anglo-Saxon times.

This will be the fifth Boundary Walk since we revived the tradition and this year we will go around the parish in a anticlockwise direction. The full walk is approximately 10 miles and there will be several rest stops and a place for a picnic lunch. There are also a few easy exit points for those that wish to take a shorter route home.

More than half of the Parish Boundary falls on private land and we have permission from the relevant land owners that will allow us to follow the boundary as closely as possible. 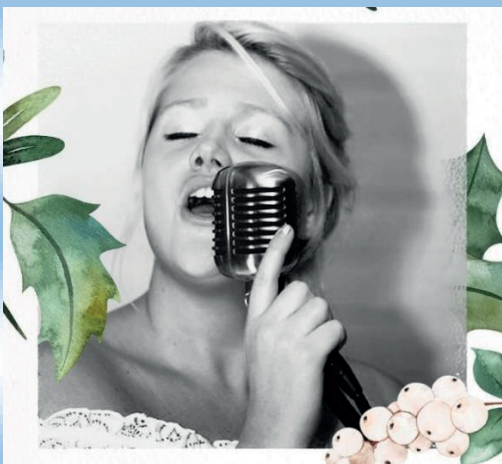

The Book Group reads

THE DESCENT OF MAN Grayson Perry

Written in 2016, *The Descent of Man* by Grayson Perry sets out his thoughts on masculinity; what it is, and how it operates. Drawing on his childhood experiences of being abused by his violent stepfather, Perry explores his changing view of behavioural norms and his attitude towards masculinity through his own role as a father and after much therapy.

In the book Perry focuses on four themes of masculinity that he believes need examining:

- *Power - how men dominate much of our world;*
- *Performance - how men dress and act the part;*
- *Violence - how men resort to crime and violence; and*
- *Emotion - how men feel.*

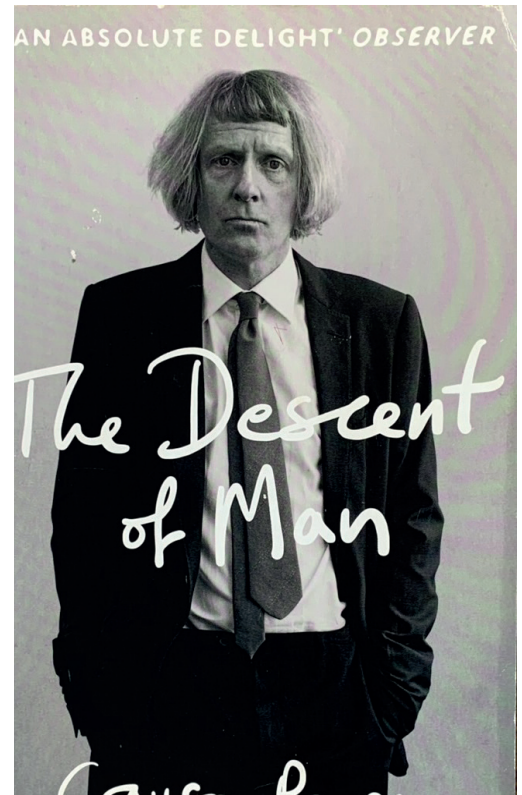
These four themes are drawn together in the Department of Masculinity where Perry explains: "Somewhere in every man's head there is a governor, an unconscious inner voice sending instructions through the intercom. This governor is the boss of every man's personal branch of the Department of Masculinity ... which wants to maintain standards."

Perry uses this imagery to explain extreme male behaviour and violence stating "If a man fails to achieve these standards he is made to feel unworthy, he may hate himself and may take it out on others." It is from this standpoint that Perry explains his background, upbringing, his own youthful violent behaviour and his belief that such normative ideals of masculinity can and should be changed.

The group agreed that this book was a lightweight and lighthearted read tackling an important subject which has been known and experienced by women for centuries. Most found it dated in its views and observational, providing a commentary on society from the perspective of a famous white male, which led us to question whether it would have been published if the author was less well known.

For some members of the group the lack of evidence to support the ideas being promulgated was irritating. The group agreed that the book might have been strengthened if he had brought in more detail of his experiences as a transvestite and the extent to which they had informed his thinking.

The book did provide a catalyst for a wide ranging and interesting discussion about today's societal norms and how the themes set out in the book sit with the current transgender issues. The group felt that culturally there is now less focus on masculine or feminine behaviours and more emphasis on behavioural traits such as empathy and consideration which are not the domain of either gender over another



but may be displayed equally by both. Indeed some of the less endearing masculine behaviours are now being seen in women as they are promoted in their careers. All members of the group were surprised at how often Perry mentioned the class structure in Britain and found his stereotypes unhelpful.

The book we'll be reviewing at our June meeting is *My Brilliant Friend* by Elena Ferrante. This is the first book of a quartet about two friends, Elena and Lila set in the 1950s, in a poor but vibrant neighbourhood on the outskirts of Naples. Growing up on these tough streets the two girls learn to rely on each other ahead of anyone or anything else. As they grow, and their paths repeatedly diverge and converge, Elena and Lila remain best friends with their respective destinies reflected and refracted in the other.

News from the Parish Council

on roads and cycle paths

The May Parish Council meeting was the Annual meeting which meant that there were more administrative issues to approve than in previous meetings. Rather than repeat what is already covered in the minutes of the meeting, it is better to comment on specific points. Hence this month's report is quite short.

NMU (Non-Motorised User) Access - update

Unfortunately, there is very little to report on the issue of the non-motorised user route (i.e. cycle path) on Oakington Road. Our County Councillor was not at the meeting and so was unable to provide any further information other than what had been reported previously. From the Parish Council's perspective, we were able to confirm that we had had confirmation that the process for Cambridge County Council to acquire the required land from National Highways was progressing, but nothing further. I have also written to our MP, Anthony Browne, to bring the issue to his attention.

A meeting is to be scheduled with representatives of the GCP (Greater Cambridge Partnership) to discuss this NMU and the one to link the village to the proposed Scotland Farm Travel Hub. This is likely to be a standalone meeting and all residents of the village would be welcome to air their views.

Condition of the village roads

As mentioned previously, I had hoped to meet with Cllr Alex Beckett, Chair of Highways and Transport, during May. Unfortunately, this did not happen, and a meeting will be scheduled for later in the year. However, I did have a meeting with people from Highways to discuss the flooding in parts of the village. There are several areas in the village which suffer from flooding, and these were brought to their attention. I was advised that the drains will be jetted and their condition investigated by camera to determine what actions are required. Further the roadside grips (shallow drainage channel at the side of the road) along Scotland Road will be cleared to assist drainage. I am waiting for confirmation of when this work will be carried out and shall report back.

Village Spring Clean

On the last Saturday of April, there was a flurry of activity to tidy the village in readiness for the celebrations for the Coronation of King Charles III. Not only was there a team in the Village Hall making it ready for the for the following weekend, but there was a team of volunteers who spent a couple of hours or so in the late spring sunshine collecting rubbish from the verges of the village. Around 15 bags of rubbish were left by the

village hall for collection by South Cambs the following Monday. The items collected by the team included various car parts (from the A1307 verges), a dog bed, cushion from an armchair, and numerous fast food and drink containers. There were three separate incidents of fly-tipping at the entrance to the sewage works on the Oakington Road which one of the team reported. Similarly, the remains of signage from the A14 works were found in the long verges and were also reported.



One observation which was made was that there were far fewer facemasks this year than there had been previously. A reflection of the times.

The next meetings of the Parish Council will be Monday 12 June at 19.30 (please note the later start time and change of day), and Monday 10 July at 19.00 (again, please note the change of day and start time).

Dry Drayton Parish News

County Report May 2023

As everyone can see, potholes are a huge problem throughout Cambridgeshire (and elsewhere in the country too) – for cyclists, cars, buses, ambulances, other vehicles and anyone wanting to use the roads. We are working hard locally to do what we can to deal with this difficult problem.

Last week in Cambridgeshire 10k potholes were recorded, and 2.7k repaired. This time last year the number of potholes recorded was half this. There are problems throughout the country but in Cambridgeshire there are particular difficulties in South Cambs and Cambridge. The real problem is the legacy of long-term underinvestment in road repairs, which makes roads vulnerable to defects. Add extreme weather and the defects appear. Current economic conditions and in particular inflationary cost increases across the highways maintenance industry (20-25% pa) mean that we have a lot more to do with a lot less.

What County officers have done is:

- *work intensively with delivery partners, Milestone, and with the supply chain to secured additional resources relatively quickly*
- *increase the resources that have gone into pothole repairs – double the teams fixing potholes and more than double the number of ‘dragon patchers’*
- *recognise that the supplier contract we have inherited is poor and must change, it is especially weak on Quality Monitoring the contractor’s work.*

A positive note is that we have deployed a more sophisticated surveying technology which can detect clusters of defects before they become fully fledged potholes, and feed the information to repair teams. Not only is this preventive work cheaper to carry out, it helps prevent all the disruption experienced in the future. This will be worked on over the summer and autumn ahead of next winter.

Dry Drayton road conditions – inspection

The County inspected Dry Drayton’s roads recently, identifying sections that are deteriorating and sections where repairs are likely to be required soon.

Officers have identified actions required in the short and medium term – note many of these are subject to monitoring and obviously as problems arise the response can change too:

- *Madingley Road, Dry Drayton and Dry Drayton Road, Madingley: potentially suitable for re-tread in medium term*
- *Scotland Road: requires patches and potholes repairs*
- *Park Street (thru village): showing signs of more major deterioration, need localised patching*
- *Park Lane: patches and potholes to be done soon but in medium term requires resurfacing using re-tread*
- *Oakington Road, In village: localised patching on edge*
- *St Neots Road, generally in ok condition but will monitor and repair any safety defects as they occur*

Flooding update

Officers have commissioned work to camera trace and survey the whole drainage system along Scotland Road and are in the process of identifying owners of the ditches so these can be cleared. The officer will ensure all Scotland Road grips are part of the Safe and Dry grip cutting sites for this year. This should make a significant difference.

But there continue to be persistent flooding around Park Street and officers are investigating this. They plan to do a full camera trace and survey here as well, including full jetting and ditch clearing, as well as lowering the gully and concrete surround in a drain in Park Street. There is a drain across unregistered land which requires investigation, it may well be that problems here are contributing to some of the persistent problems.

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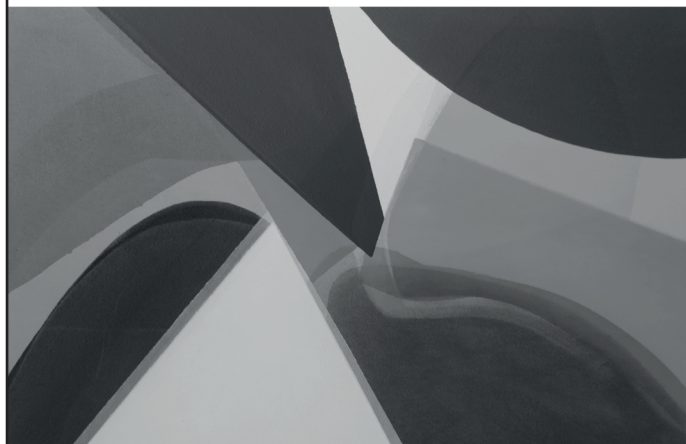
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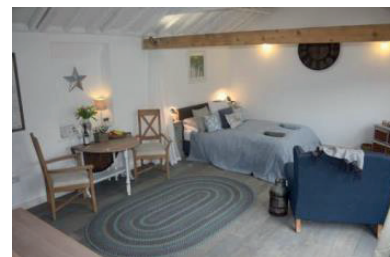
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
