Caring for creation at St Peter and St Paul's Church

The local church community has long been committed to creation care through deliberate strategies to maintain our beautiful rural churchyard as sensitively as possible, *writes Lynda Taylor*. In 2022 our efforts were rewarded by the local Wildlife Trusts with their Bronze Award.

This year the Parochial Church Council (PCC) agreed we should seek to build on that achievement by reviewing our commitment to environmental stewardship in other areas of our life together: worship and teaching; building and land; community and global engagement; and lifestyle.

To help us do this, we are using resources from a Christian environmental charity, A Rocha. Their EcoChurch scheme is helping us to audit each of the key areas, highlighting where we are already doing quite well and, more importantly, those areas we need to work on. In October 2023 we applied for and successfully achieved the Bronze EcoChurch Award. It is now on display in church along with more details of the scheme.

Over the coming months we shall continue to look for ways we can strengthen our environmental credentials

 as individuals, families and as a whole church community.

We are now formally registered as a Fairtrade Church, using fairly traded products such as coffee, tea and sugar in our church kitchen, as well as fairly traded communion wine and linen for our services.

This term the church Bible study group is exploring environmental concerns from a faith-based perspective, and a new outdoor 'Forest Church' service takes place once a month on a Sunday afternoon.

In October we held two churchyard working parties on successive Saturday mornings to help keep our churchyard in good order – trimming hedges and overhanging branches, clearing weeds from graves, and tidying pathways. Our aim is to ensure that the churchyard, with a public footpath running through it, remains a welcoming and well-managed habitat for flora and wildlife as well as a safe and pleasant space for human recreation and contemplation.

We know that many in our congregation and in the wider village make a range of lifestyle choices that reflect personal commitment to environmental care and concern: whether in relation to sustainable travel, or careful recycling, or reducing plastic, or creating a wild space in their garden, or purchasing fairly traded

The Book Group reads 'Time Shelter'

Time Shelter Georgi Gospodinov

t our October meeting we were delighted to welcome a new member to the group who has recently moved into the village. The focus of discussion was Time Shelter by Georgi Gospodinov which won the International Booker Prize 2023. A mysterious fictitious therapist, Gaustine, establishes a clinic that treats patients with Alzheimer's by recreating the times in which they felt most secure. The "past-clinic" begins with different rooms and floors appropriately decorated with carefully curated furnishings from the past. As the rooms develop they recreate the smells of the period, as well as reprinting the daily papers from that time. These and many other tactics make the rooms more convincing of the time they depict which gives solace to the patients in the clinic.

From this starting premise the book then looks at the unintended consequences which arise when an increasing number of healthy people seek out the clinic as a 'time shelter', hoping to escape the realities of modern life. The narrator meets with old friends in Bulgaria who run a re-enactment organisation, recreating some of the famous protests and marches in Bulgaria's history with devastating consequences. Meanwhile across Europe the notion of political parties promoting different decades in their national histories is explored with referenda being fought on which particular past era and events will best characterise a country's identity. The final part of the story depicts the narrator's failing memory and his own mental return to safe periods in his past. Time Shelter is a contemporary book written in the period between the Brexit referendum and the Russian invasion of Ukraine both seismic events, which some might view as trying to control the future by selecting and promoting particular aspects from the past.

The group agreed that this was an excellent translation of a brave, cleverly written book which tackled some difficult subjects. There was general agreement that the first section depicting the "past-clinic" was well described and enjoyable. However as the book progressed many of the group found it to be disjointed and in many cases left them wondering what it was about. Other members of the group enjoyed the, often dark, humour in the text. The discussion which followed explored individual's thoughts on whether we could, and would want to, identify a period from our own pasts to provide safety for our own memories. It also posed the question "when do our memories become history" which gave rise to some interesting thoughts but no resolution. The writer's statement



that "Nationalism stole my country" also rang true for some members of the group given events in their earlier lives. Whilst this is obviously fiction, the group agreed that it does not read as a novel but rather an extended essay that was an absurd, humorous, yet thought provoking meditation on memory.

The book we will be reviewing at our November meeting is Death at La Fenice by Donna Leon. Set in Venice this follows the investigation into the death of Maestro Helmut Wellauer, a world-renowned conductor, who died from cyanide poisoning during an intermission at La Fenice. This is the first in an extensive series of novels by Donna Leon about Guido Brunetti the Vice-commissario of police in Venice. who she introduces in this novel.

Launch of a Fundraising Appeal

ear Friends, we will soon be writing to you about a new Fundraising Appeal that we are launching in early November to ask the village for any help you can please give us again.

Like so many others, we are facing increasing running costs and are struggling to meet them. It has become harder to find the funds to keep the church lit, heated and maintained so that it's safe to use. We need to work hard to keep the church open as a space that the village is welcome to use - and has done, for everything from school Harvest Festival services to Christmas concerts to Feast Week ceilidhs.

It costs over £70 a day to run the church but our regular income falls far short of that. So we are increasingly dependent on donations and fundraisers to make up the shortfall.





News from the Parish Council

Installation of 40 mph buffer zones around village to go ahead

was unable to attend the October meeting of the Parish Council due to illness, writes Chair Stephen Aldersley. As per usual, all items discussed will be summarised in the minutes of the September meeting, but points which I think may be of broader interest are summarised below. Unfortunately, they are points which have been covered on previous occasions and are yet to be resolved.

NMU (Non-Motorised User) Access - update

As in previous months, the situation has not changed. I have contacted Highways for an update on the acquisition of the necessary land required for the NMU but have not had a response. I shall continue to followup on this and shall also enlist the help of our County Councillor. However, I am concerned by the silence and so my next task will be to contact other parishes who did not receive funding for NMUs to find out what actions they are taking. More news as and when.

Scotland Farm Travel Hub and NMU (Non-Motorised User) Access

As was mentioned in last month's newsletter, Kerry Allen, the Project Manager for the NMU to the Scotland Farm Travel Hub visited Dry Drayton on 3 October. My fellow councillors attended the site meeting and as mentioned in the forthcoming minutes, investigations are being carried out for a proposed NMU to link the village to the travel hub at Scotland Farm using a route either by Callow Brook, or by Scotland Road, or a combination of the two. Uncertainty has already been expressed about the suitability of a route by Callow Brook and I know from feedback from residents that this is not a preferred option for various reasons.

Kerry is expected to report back to the Parish Council sometime next month, and whilst the suggestions may not be feasible, they would represent a starting point for discussions. However, as I pointed out in last month's article, there is no local funding available, and if it happens, it would have to be funded through government funds.

Cambridge Road, Madingley

The Parish Council has objected to the closure of Cambridge Road, Madingley and Cllr. Granger has sent details of the objections to Clare Rankin who is the Principal Active Travel Officer at Cambridgeshire County Council.

The Parish Council has to discuss the response we have received from Clare Rankin at our next meeting, but she stated that our "negative feedback" (aka objections) to the scheme will be made clear in the committee report. Reading between the lines, I am not optimistic that any changes will be made to the scheme.

Local Highways Improvement (LHI) application

As has been mentioned previously, Dry Drayton has been successful in our application for the HGV weight advisory signage and the 40mph buffer zones at the entrances to the village. It has been requested that the buffer zones on the approaches to the village from the A428 and A1307 be extended to the nearest junctions, thereby removing the short distances which would have a limit of 60mph. I am waiting for a response to this request.

Traffic calming measures - 20mph village wide application

Unfortunately, our application was unsuccessful, and we were ranked 59th out of 76 applicants. There will be the opportunity to apply once again at the beginning of 2024 and whilst this year's application can be rolled over, I need to determine what could be done to ensure that the application stands a better chance of success.
